Preface....

The basic goal of the institution is to impart higher education to rural masses in general and girls in particular. Our vision is "Reaching to the Unreached". Since the very inception of this institute, we are working in this direction. The institution began its first unit (senior college) Late Ramesh Warpudkar Arts & Comm. College, Sonpeth in 1994 with the purpose of imparting qualitative & value based Higher Education to the rural people deprived from such formal education. Before 1990, no such unit of higher education did exist within the territory of 40 kms. The call from the rural masses prompted our management to open Late Ramesh Warpudkar Arts and comm. college, Sonpeth. This is the only unit in Sonpeth Taluka to impart higher education in traditional disciplines. Later on, the persistent demand on the part of the parents forced the management to begin science unit in 2008. This college permanently affiliated to S.R.T.M. University, Nanded and it is included under 2(f) and 12(B) of UGC Act since 2006. The college has two acres of land having its own building. More than 90% staff resides in the college campus area. Presently more than four hundred students are pursuing their higher educatin in various disciplines.

Since the opening of the college, our attempts are towards attaining the excellence in education. This is the beginning and we are aware that we have to travel long to achieve it. I would like to state that the process of NAAC created a positive atmosphere among the faculty members. We have made sincere efforts & honest retrospections while preparing this self-study Report. We have highlighted strengths & not ignored the weaknesses. The SSR is prepared as per the newly formed guidelines by NAAC. We believe that to get our college accredited by an esteemed & autonomous body like NAAC will be a matter of pride & privilege. From the Table of President....

The town Sonpeth, literally means a store of gold. The town was Taluka place under the reign of Nizam of Hydrabad. After independence, it has lost its administrative position and remained isolated and undeveloped. Since there is no highway linkage, it remained isolated from rest of the Parbhani District. The lack of leadership resulted in the neglect of all round development of the town/region. The town is 80m Kms away from the District place. Usually the students used to stop their education after 12th Class because they had to go 40 kms away for higher education, which was financially and practically impossible. Briefly, the rural masses of the region were depriving of higher education before 1994. By taking this need in view, our visionary founder president Late Rajabhau Kadam established Hanuman Shikshan Prasarak Mandal, Sonpeth Dist Parbhani in 1993. The management began its first unit Late Ramesh Warpudkar ACS College at Sonpeth in 1994. Before this, no senior college did exist in the town. The prime goal of the institution was to make available the higher education to rural masses. The logo of the management states (in Sanskrit); "Dnayanat Dharm Tataha Sukham" meaning "happiness lies in imparting the knowledge". In 2008, management began science faculty and Rajabhau Kadam High School at Vita village and junior college at Sonpeth in 2010. Initially the college was in the rented building but in 2008, the management purchased the two acres of land and erected the adequate infrastructure. The management helped the college staff to have their own quarters in the campus itself. This resulted in the 24 hrs availability of college employees in the campus. Today the management is happy to see that it has become successful in fulfilling the prime objective of the institution i.e. providing quality education to rural masses. This year we have stepped in the 20th year of its existence. It gives me pleasure the senior college is going to submit SSR this year. The accreditation by NAAC will help us to enhance the quality of education and provide us opportunity to overcome certain weaknesses. I congratulate Principal Dr. Vasant Satpute and his team for stepping in the realm of assessment and accreditation. Executive Summary

(Criteria wise Report)

It is our privilege to give brief history of our college. Late Ramesh Warpudkar ACS College,Sonpeth Dist. Parbhani is constantly developing for last two decades. Our visionary leader late Rajabhau Dadarao Kadam, the founder president of Hanuman Shikshan Prasarak Mandal, Sonpeth, had a dream that the people of this rural, uneducated & undeveloped area should get higher education with open access system, irrespective of caste, colour, creed and religion. The college established in 1994. The college is located at Sonpeth-Parli (Vaijanath) road, 1 km away from Sonpeth city & surrounded by highly fertile black cotton soil land and farms. Initially when college started there were only 42 students. But gradually strength of students increased. Presently near about 400 students are pursuing their education in various disciplines. It is affiliated to Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded.

Earlier the college had Arts and Commerce faculties only, but in 2008, by keeping in view the need of the stakeholders, college introduced science faculty. Apart from this, the college stared UGC-NRC Centre, COC course of English communication skills, Carrier and Counseling Cell with the financial assistance of UGC. The medium of instruction for Commerce and Arts faculty is Marathi. The students are admitted in the college on first come first served basis. We admit all the students from the rural areas. Naturally, we have the students from diverse background, different religions, castes creed, from weaker section of society, labor class, farming society, who have to toil to make both ends meet. For the economically weaker students we teachers have started the Student Adoption Scheme in college. This department ensures the regular and needy students, and assists them to remit their examination fees, pay for bus passes and help them to take higher education without any hindrance. Keeping in view that 'lotus exists in mud'; we try to render our services to the stakeholders of the region.

The college has N.S.S unit of 100 students. Students participate in various social activities like survey and rallies. Besides this, the departments of language, social sciences and sciences have started their Departmental Study Circles. These study circles organize various activities like seminars, guest lectures, group discussions and publication of wall posters on various occasions in the college. The students also participate in youth festival, sports competition and Research festivals at university level. For effective teaching /learning process the use of Library, L.C.D. Projector, Laptops, DVD, TV, Internet, workshop, conference, seminar participation have been promoted by college.

I. Curricular Aspect

The vision of the college is to cater value-based education for all round development of rural students to make them capable to touch the new horizons of knowledge and employment for their better future, as well as to make them responsible citizens for the service of community. Late Ramesh Warpudkar College offers B.A., B. Com, B. Sc. courses at UG level. The college also runs UGC sponsored carrier oriented programme i.e. Communicative English. Since the college has to follow university syllabus, we do not design courses or syllabus. Some of our staff members are the members of Board of Studies in Parent University. Principal achieves the stated objectives of the curriculum from inspection in regular meetings. Industrial tours/historical/geographical& biological visits are arranged for the first hand knowledge to students. The institution has clearly set &defined mechanism of obtaining feedback from students, parents and alumni to improve the performance and quality of the institutional provisions. The exit level feedback from graduates' regarding learning process is collected & it is used to improvise the overall competence of students.

II. Teaching- learning & Evaluation

Admissions to the under graduate B.A, B.Com & B Sc. courses are done as per the rules and regulations laid down by parent university. The college has constituted an admission committee comprising of senior teachers. The admission committee selects eligible students on the first come first admitted basis. Counseling is provided to the students / parents by counseling cell, if needed. The institution has mechanism to review the admission process and student profile annually. Admission committee collects detailed information about the students that helps office for processing further data. The co-education exists in the college and it aims at imparting holistic education with sufficient weightage to ethical and moral principles.

Similarly career oriented courses develop employable skills among the students. To enhance the teaching learning process, advanced teaching aids like L.C.D. Projector, TV, DVD Player, Tape recorder etc. is being employed. Faculty members participate in conferences, seminars workshops, refresher courses and orientation programmes to update their knowledge and skills. Principal and IQAC monitors the teaching learning process of the college. Evaluation process is actually carried out by the parent university. However, to enhance the performance of students, institution conducts unit tests, seminars, group discussions, presentation etc.

III. Research consultancy & Extension

To promote research culture among the faculty and students, research committee has been established as per university guidelines. Fourteen faculties have received Ph.D. and three faculties have received recognition as M. Phil. / Ph. D. supervisor of various universities from Maharashtra and other states. Under the guidance of Principal Dr. Satpute V. D. (English) ten students have completed their M. Phil. He is the recognized Ph. D. guide of SRTM University, Nanded where nine students are registered for Ph. D. One research student has been awarded Ph. D. by SRTM University, Nanded. He is also the Ph. D. guide of J.J.T. University, Rajasthan and Bhartiyar University, Koimbtur (T.N.) where two students are pursuing their Ph. D. and one candidate has received Ph.D. from SRTM University, Nanded. Dr. Kulkarni V. B. (Hindi) also received the recognition as Ph. D. guide of SRTM University, Nanded. Ten faculties have completed their M. Phil from various universities. Six faculties have registered for Ph.D. work. Most of the faculties from the college attended & presented papers in University, State, National and International Conferences, Seminars

and Workshops. Three Minor Research Projects have been sanctioned by the UGC, four Minor Research Projects and one Major Research Project has been submitted to UGC. Several initiatives are taken, like internet connectivity; tie up with other libraries, other university laboratories & computer institutes to foster research activity.

The N.S.S. Unit of the college is active in rendering extension services. Students are participating in awareness rallies on issues like female foeticide, Global warming, save environment, flood relief fund rallies, Aids Rallies etc. The SRTM University, Nanded arranged 'Avishkar-2012- A District Level Research Festival' for promotion and motivation of hidden skills among UG students. In 'Avishkar-2012' of University, two teams of our college participated and one team got the Second Prize for their research presentation on '*The Study of the Small Scale Industries in Sonpeth*' in the research festival. In Avishkar 2013, the college has received two awards i.e. First prize for science project and second prize for Arts project. The availability of toilets-latrine and educational survey of village Awalgaon & Wanisangam is done by NSS Volunteers during NSS Special Camp 2012-2013 & 2013-2014 respectively.

The students and teachers belonging to science faculty have sent their applications for 'Sixth International Science Conclave-2013' at Allahabad.

IV. Infrastructure & Learning Resources

In order to create and enhance the infrastructure facilities for effective teaching and learning the policy is framed according to the strength of students in different streams. The policy also confirms the strength as per the lecturer appointed for the institution. The college is endowed with physical infrastructure facility to support the teaching learning process. The main campus is spread over two acres of land. Master plan has been prepared for the campus. Our college has spacious auditorium, adequate number of classrooms & well equipped laboratories. The college has established well equipped computer laboratory with 6 computers & one laptop. The faculties of the college are given access to internet so that they can enrich their knowledge & foster research activities.

An automated Language Lab system with voice recording, playback, one to one interaction facility is available for language learning and enhancement of effective communication skills.

The outdoor/indoor games facilities like Table tennis, chess, carom, Kabaddi, Kho-Kho, Athletics, volleyball etc. are provided to the students in the college campus. The college has one N.S.S. unit of 100 students. The college has been regularly participating in pulse polio eradication campaign, blood donation etc. The college provides filtered RO water, which has a very special concern for the health and hygiene of the college students. The institution ensures infrastructural facilities for physically challenged students. The college also provides recreation facilities through programmes like gathering and other cultural activities. The college has a good library and fulfills adequate requirements of the students. The library advisory committee discusses and finalizes academic requirements. The institution has developed library with automation. In the forthcoming years, the college has to strive hard for making library rich and update. The college has built women hostel building for 21 girl students but unfortunately no girl student applied for accommodation. Hence, with the permission of the governing body, presently the building is being used for academic purposes since we do not have adequate infrastructure.

V. Student support and progression

The institution publishes its prospectus annually. It provides all the necessary information regarding the admission procedure, eligibility criteria, scholarships, faculties, awards, optional subjects, various committees and activities to be engaged during the year etc,. The college prospectus provides complete profile of the college. Institution provides scholarship & free ships to the students as per the rules and regulations of Govt. of India, Govt. of Maharashtra and Govt. open merit scholarship. The college caters to the academic need of the students belonging to the rural masses. Majority of students who belong to the non creamy layer of the society, are from weaker sections of the society. For such students, the college provides financial help. This is done under the '**Student Welfare Scheme'** formed by the college staff members, where each employee contributes for the well being of the financially weaker students.

There is reservation for students belonging to differently- able category, the college motivates the students to take part in state and national level competitive examinations. The institution has Carrier Counseling & Guidance Cell. The college also invites guest lecturers to guide the students for carrier guidance. The students get guidance & take benefit of it in selection of employment. Student representatives are selected in committees namely Students' Council, Study Circles, magazines, consumer society etc. Grievance Redressal Cell actively interacts with the students to help them sort out their grievances. Similarly Anti Ragging Committee, Sexual Harassment Cell, Women's Cell was constituted to take all necessary measures to ensure the safety and dignity of female students. The question bank, book bank help the students to overcome their problems and ultimately helps them to progress towards higher level of education & employment.

VI. Governance, leadership and Management

Management Committee, Local Managing Committee, Students Council & various college committees play effective role in organizational arrangement of the institution. The management always encourages the participation of the staff in the process of decision making in institutional functioning with periodic meetings with staff and principal. The Principal is the head of institution and bears the ultimate responsibility for smooth functioning of the college. The role of the Principal of the college is multi dimensional. The Principal of the institution has the authority to govern the institution according to the rules and regulations of Governing Body, State Govt., UGC as well as the Parental University.

The management of the college is in constant touch with head of the institution and has amicable support. The Principal keeps eye on the performance of faculty through PBAS (Performance Based Appraisal System). Welfare schemes like loan facilities, group insurance etc. is available to faculty members. IQAC is effective in planning, maintaining, implementation and improvement of the institution. IQAC advises to the activities & plans, put forth by various departments and also keeps in touch with other departments.

VII. Innovation and best practices

There is no formal conduction of Green Audit in the institution but we are taking necessary steps to ensure a clean and healthy environment. There is provision of ventilation in each and every classroom, it resulted in the limited use of fans and light which ultimately saves us from having too much consumption of electricity. Our college has bore well in the college campus for drinking and other purposes. The message of water conservation is given through the students of National Service Scheme. The best practices in the institution have been promoted process of developing and maintaining quality both academic and administrative systems. The institution has internalized the best practice in order to improve functioning with student participation for the quality of education. The faculty provides multiple choices Question Bank which help students at university level examination. Wallpapers are being published regularly on various occasions by every department which helps students in developing co curricular activities. The college administrative block has been fully computerized, which helps for smooth functioning & timesaving in administrative process. The best practices have been promoted the process of developing & maintaining quality of both academic & administrative system.

Apart from these, the college has started The Students Adoption Scheme, *Mata-Pita Adhar Yojana*, **Best Student of the Year Award**, Excellence awards for Star Performer have been instituted as a token of appreciation for the students with proven record of excellence throughout their campus and **Best Teacher of the Year Award** by which the teachers are motivated to take more efforts to make the name of the institution in the vicinity.

1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 State the vision, mission and objectives of the institution, and describe how these are communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders.

Vision:

• "To offer opportunities of the empowerment to the rural learners by imparting quality higher education within the capacities."

Objectives:

- To strive for imparting higher education to rural masses in general and girls in particular.
- To seek socio-cultural transformation of rural youths.
- To inculcate the values like national integration, patriotism, liberty, equality, fraternity, humanity and tolerance among youths.
- To nurture the quality of social and civil responsibilities among the students.
- To create youths capable to be employed.

Communication to Stakeholders:

The frequent meetings of the Principal and staff are held, in which the plans, programmes and various key issues in tune with the vision and mission of the institution were discussed in detail. Decisions taken in the Principal's meetings with the staff are communicated properly to the entire students through displaying notices on the notice board and making announcements in the class rooms. The following criterion is followed to communicate the vision, mission and objectives of the college to the stakeholders. The vision and mission are displayed at the main entrance of the college. It is communicated to the students through college prospectus, college magazine and during the welcome fresher programme. The vision, mission & objectives of the college are also displayed on the college website.

1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

For effective implementation of the curriculum, the BA, B Com and B Sc syllabus are displayed on SRTMU, Nanded website and the web link of University given to the students as well the syllabus dictated in the classroom. The students study this syllabus and get the ideas about curriculum. Similarly for effective implementation of the curriculum, the initial step is to prepare annual/semester pattern timetable for arts, commerce & science faculty. The Time Table and Yearly Planning Committee make framework of the total pattern about the implementation of the syllabus with the yearly and monthly planning of the academic year. The Heads of the every department make division of workload is as per university and UGC norms among the member of the department and distributes the syllabus among the member. Apart from regular and traditional teaching methods, faculties are instructed to impart the curriculum through innovative teaching methods such as assignments, group discussion, seminars, workshops, industrial visits and science departmental visits to various colleges and universities in Maharashtra. At the outset, the Principal of the college conducts meetings with faculties to develop the various strategies for effective implementation of the curriculum. Apart from this, the faculties are prompted to use ICT while teaching in classrooms.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

Institution follows the syllabus from the parent University. The teachers study the syllabus and design the action plan of curriculum and dictate it to the students. The Principal of the college inspects the work of teachers through various meetings & take the students feedback which in turn is communicated to the teachers.

The faculty of the college can discuss their issues or problems while participating in the meeting of Board of Studies. Even though, some teachers communicate with the BOs of their subject about the contents of the syllabus. The college also encourages teachers to participate in the Orientation / Refresher Course /Workshop / Seminar organized by the affiliating universities and other institutions. It improves the teaching methods and help them to keep knowledge updated.

1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency.

By the deliverance of effective curriculum, we give weightage to academic meetings with all the faculties of the college. At the same time, the institution gives the sufficient importance to overall development through N.S.S., cultural activities, games and sports. The college relies upon the globally trusted and followed teaching strategy i.e., the chalk and talk method. However, the college and teaching faculty have taken many initiatives for effective deliverance of the curriculum. The Heads of Departments of our college informally meet the member of Board of Studies and HOD of other colleges and discuss about the changes in the curriculum and examination patterns of the university.

The college faculties are trained in using the computers which make them familiar with the uses of computer so that they can use the modern technological resources like Internet, Projector, and OHP's for innovative classroom teaching. The college also organizes Personality Development Programme for the stakeholders. The students are also taken out for educational tours such as Industrial Tour, Science Tour and places of historical importance to provide them firsthand knowledge of the various things.

1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalisation of the curriculum?

For quality enhancement, the students are given exposure to the industry tour like Cotton Industry, Electronic Loom. Similarly, the Arts faculty members arrange Historical, Industrial tours. It creates awareness among the students. Similarly, the various departments of the college arrange the subject Seminars by which all students of the subject take part and try to teach the topic to their classmates. The Principal is regularly conducting the formal and informal meetings with the faculties during the academic session, which motivates the faculties. Our faculties are motivating the students for doing the research projects through various research festivals arranged by Parent University as well as to participate in the various conferences, workshops with research paper. In Aviskar-2012 (The Parbhani District Research Festival) our college team got the Second Prize for its research Presentation in Social Sciences. The college team also got the First Prize for Research Presentation by Arts faculty students in Aviskar-2013 (The Parbhani District Research Festival)

1.1.6 What are the contributions of the institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the University? Institution does not have freedom to design the syllabus or curriculum. The University frames the syllabus or curriculum. Some of our staff members are in the Board of studies in the University. They contribute in the process of preparing the curriculum. They give the suggestions in the Board of Studies and contribute themselves in formation of the curriculum books from the board. Some of our staff members are contributing in making curriculum at the University level. They contributed in the works like paper setting, assessment and moderation in university.

Dr. Satpute V.D. is the member of BOS in English and member faculty of Arts in SRTM University, Nanded. Dr. Tengse S.A. also the BOS member of Sociology in SRTM University, Nanded. Dr. Satpute V. D. edited the two curriculum books of English titled *The Prism* for BA, B Com., B Sc. and other faculties. He also edited another curriculum book of English titled *The Spectrum* for BA, B Com., & B Sc. Syllabus-2013. The faculty suggests the syllabus and examination pattern wherever asked by the university.

Student feedback is taken by the Principal and the lacunas being discussed with teachers with certain instructions by the Principal. Along with the suggestions to the teachers of the college, the Principal also give the needful instructions to the stakeholder from the various programmes held in the college.

The college also ensures that during the course of implementation, the stated objectives of the curriculum are achieved.

• Enrichment courses

The Faculty members empower the knowledge of the stakeholders by using the OHP and various videos for update and enrich the curriculum.

We also celebrate various renowned leader's, thinker's and writers' birth and death anniversaries with the publication of the wallpapers on the contributions of the personalities. Our college teachers' research team inspires students to do the research by making various projects. This teachers' research team send the college teams to the various research festivals. Our research students got first and Second prize at District level in Avishkar research festival-2012. In 2013, at university level, one project from science desciplene stood second at university level and another from social science stoo second at district level in Avishkar research festival-2013.

At UG level the college is following University's instructions about the compulsory paper entitled 'Environmental Studies' for third year in all streams. The syllabus has been designed and developed in such a way by the University that ecology and environment protection and preservation, value orientation, global and national demands have made their entry significantly in the course of time by the study of the subject.

1.2.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to modify, enrich and organize the curriculum to explicitly reflect the experiences of the students and cater to needs of the dynamic employment market?

As discussed in point 1.3.1, the college strictly adheres to the syllabus designed by Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded; but while delivering the syllabus content to the students, our faculties are bound to make the all-round development of the students with help of new formed syllabus of university. In the same way we provide computer facilities in library and laboratories. Internet facility is made available to the students. OHP, computers, LCD projectors, Dish T.V. have been used for effective communication and teaching. Through our Carrier and Counseling Cell, we organize the scholar speeches of the various successful officers from the various departments. Also we develop skill of communication in students for further employment.

1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

The cross cutting issues like Gender, Climate Change, Environment Education, Human Rights, etc., find an ample space when it comes to applying them positively into the curriculum. The issue of women foeticide is discussed in NSS programmes. The NSS volunteers have been participated in the awareness rally on the issue of women foeticide arranged by the Daily Newspaper *Sakal*. The subject of environmental studies is a part of college curriculum. It is compulsory for all the third year students, irrespective of any streams. We have Women's Grievance Cell. The Women's Grievance Cell sensitizes the students about current issues. The cell creates an awareness of the socio-cultural, political and biological complexities of the issue. In collaboration with NSS unit, the cell organizes guest lectures on the women's rights, employment opportunities etc. Blood donation camp and rallies for flood affected persons, save woman child were organized by NSS department.

1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students? Moral and ethical values employable and life skills better career options community orientation.

NSS wing of the college engages the students in community development activities which motivates the students to take up the courses of social services.

Moral and Ethical Values:

The college NSS team regularly visits surrounding areas and village where people are provided awareness on various social, moral, ethical principles and way of life. The students are also motivated by way of special lecturers so as to instill moral and ethical values in them.

Employable and life skills:

The college is aware that the need of communication skill is vital for the students for better career options. Therefore, institution arranges group discussion, essay-writing competitions, hand writing workshops at regular intervals in regional and English language. The college also started the COC course with the help of UGC to improve the writing and spoken English skills among the students of our college. The Students are also allotted different responsibilities in organizing various events and activities, such as cultural programmes /competition etc. In this way they improve their team building and organization skill. The Women's Grievance Cell provides the knowledge/tips to develop various skills useful for their future life to girl students. The college organized the 'Workshop on Apiculture' in January 2014 where the students participated and understand 'Apiculture' as a business.

Better career options:

The college provides computers to the students to develop their skill of basic computer operating principles which includes basic computer operation, MS Office, Internet operation etc. Apart from this, the students belonging to the Commerce study 'Tally' with the help of computers, which can provide earning to the students in future.

Community orientation:

For community orientation college provides personality development programmers, debate, competition and computer coaching classes. The college NSS team regularly visits surrounding areas and villages, where people are provided awareness on various social, moral principle and ways of life.

1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

The institution has various channels to collect document, responses on curriculum from the stakeholders. The Principal, being the head of the institution is responsible for collecting feedback from the stakeholders through periodic meetings. The Principal's office will then process and submit the analysis report and present it to the college managing committee. The Principal reviews the analysis reports and initiates interventions. With this, the Principal collects the feedback from the stakeholders about the activeness of the faculties

during the every academic year. After collection of these feedback forms from the students, the Principal conveys the strong points and lacunas from the teaching skills with the help of the letters. After getting the suggestions from the Principal, our teachers make improvements in their teaching style as well as increase the understanding of the students with the use of ICT etc.

1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

The institution has a very clear and transparent way to monitor and evaluate the quality of various enrichment programmes initiated by it. The feedback in the form of interactions, discussions and suggestions is analyzed by a constituted committee and report is submitted to the head of the Department. An advisory committee meets with the higher authority like Principal and the Managing committee from time to time and amends the enrichment programmes to meet the desired objective. The institution makes sure that the programmes offered in the curriculum include contribution to national development. In the same way the college uses education as the tool for empowering women and through the transaction of the curriculum it has adopted, it seeks to address the all round development of the students enrolled in the various academic programs. The college also runs the *Jagar Janivancha* cell by which the students are aware about the protection of female gender with the gender awareness.

1.4 Feedback System

1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

The institution is affiliated to Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded and therefore, there is no scope for framing institution's curriculum on its own. We have to follow University syllabus. Since, systematic mechanism is installed in the institution to look after the affairs of the feedback process and analysis through member of board of studies. Some of our staff members are on the board of studies of University. They give suggestions about the syllabus in the meetings. Heads of Departments of our college, informally meet the member of Board of Studies and HOD of other college to discuss the changes in curriculum. Faculty members regularly attend workshop and seminar arranged by university or other institution regarding design and development of curriculum.

1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

Yes, the Principal of the college take feedback from the students about the teaching style, understanding of the subject, MCQ, communication between students and teachers. After collecting this feedback from the stakeholders, the Principal of the college communicate with the faculties and hand over the strong and weak points of the faculties in the college. The feedbacks are discussed in the staff council meetings. The institution takes part in the curriculum development process through appropriate analysis of feedback given

by the various faculties but yet not the stakeholders of the college. Our BOS members Dr. Satpute V. D. and Dr. Tengse S.A. actively participate in the formation of the curriculum of the SRTM University, Nanded in the subject of English Optional, Compulsory and Sociology respectively. Apart from this, our faculty members send the letters of suggestions for the formation of UG curriculum of SRTMU, Nanded.

Taking into consideration the rural students demand and to develop scientific temper in the student the college started Science faculty in 2008-09. Before this there were only Arts and Commerce faculties in our college. Similarly science faculty was not available in Sonpeth Taluka. The students used to go at district place for seeking admission in science faculty. Therefore institution started the science faculty. In future, we propose to start Post Graduation courses, namely post graduation in Marathi, History and Commerce at PG level

2.1 Student enrolment and profile

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process? Publicity

The college has well set & tested regulation for admission of students to B.A., B.Com. and B.Sc. faculties. The college employs the following measures:

a) Advertisement:

Advertisement is being done through pamphlets, flexes at main roads, mouth publicity by our students, Alumni students and faculty members & non- teaching staff. Sometimes, our faculty visits to nearby villages and aware the students about various programmes and the importance of the education.

b) Prospectus:

The prospectus is issued every year which contains information of the courses offered, eligibility, duration, admission procedure, curricular & co curricular activities, library facilities etc.

c) Institutional Website:

The institution has an update website. All the information regarding institution and admission process, faculty etc. are displayed on website **www.warpudkarcollege.com**. It is updated by new information & changes if any. Apart from this, the college prospectus is displayed on the college website.

Transparency

As our institution is situated in area and since we do not have much junior college in area our quota of admission remains unfulfilled. The admissions are being allotted on first come first served basis. There is no issue of donation or extra fees. Hence admission process is totally transparent and social justice is ensured.

2.1.2. The college has constituted an admission committee comprising of four senior teachers who are involved in the admission committee for selection of eligible student on the basis of 'first come first admit'. The counseling team helps the students to make the choice of subjects.

The committee scrutinizes the application form with respect to fulfillment of the eligibility criteria prescribed for admission by the SRTM University, Nanded. The Collage follows reservation policy of the State Government (if essential).

The selection of the students of B. A., B. Com. and B.Sc.is made on the basis of SRTM University, Nanded. We give admission to all the students those who pass in 12th class. The following chart shows the minimum and maximum percentage of admitted students during last six years.

Demand ratio is not shown in the chart since we got less application forms for the admission, less than quota of institution, given by University. Hence we provide the admission to all students. Spot admissions are available in our institution within the stipulated dates. The condition of unemployment in D.T. Ed. Courses after 2011, the results increased of the first year students.

2.2 Catering to Diverse Needs of students

The institution strictly follows educational policies of Govt. of Maharashtra regarding differently able students. The institution as a whole, maintain an open door policy with respect to the needs of differently able students. The following provisions are available.

4) Provision for extra time during the examination as per university norms.

The college is situated in rural area of Marathwada region of Maharashtra. We admit students from such area. They are in confusion about selection of streams & subjects at the time of admission. Counseling & orientation is done by the admission committee. Our institute runs Career Oriented Course in English. The information regarding the skill/ courses is given at the time of admission. In order to satisfy queries & doubts of the students the teachers are always available.

2.2.3. what are the strategies drawn and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice? (Bridge/ Remedial / Add-on/ Enrichment courses) etc.

Newly enrolled students have options to change faculty or subject within 15 days from the actual beginning of college. Till date we haven't organized Remedial Coaching however the business is accomplished by coaching on personal level.

2.2.4. How does the college sensitize its staff & students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The college aims to impart holistic education with sufficient weightage to ethical, moral principles. Our college has a co-educational system. It sensitizes its staff & students on issues like gender inclusion, environment etc, by holding various programmes like participation in rally on female foeticide, women empowerment and Flood relief rallies and by Celebration of women's day, Savitribai Phule birth anniversary etc. Poster competition is organized on the cause of female foeticide (Beti Bachao). As stated earlier, college offers the subject of environmental studies as a compulsory subject for third year irrespective of any streams at UG level. We have a special cell 'Jagar Janiwancha' which is working in this direction.

2.2.5. How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

The advanced learners are detected by the teachers during their lectures in class room by means of getting feedback from the students orally and sometimes in writing. Students are subjected to various methods of evaluation like signaled answers, vocal responses, and sample individual's responses and written test after each unit of syllabus. Based on their performance students are identified as slow and advanced learners. The teachers take extra pain in helping them with an additional and personal interest. They are provided additional learning materials and healthy cooperation from the teacher. Further advanced learners are motivated for higher education, carrier options. Slow learners are supported in the best possible manner to channelize there potential for success.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged section of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc.)?

As it is stated our institution is situated in rural area, the students from the disadvantaged section of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. are admitted in the college. The teacher detects it during their lectures in class room. We use the various methods of evaluation, like vocal responses, sample individuals responses like seminars and group discussions after each unit of syllabus.

These students who do not seem to cope up with the pace of learning are advised and counseled by the teachers by providing them required study material. They are specially advised and counseled so as to improve themselves. Based on their performance and various practices of evaluation students are identified as slow and advanced learners. To bridge the gap between them, the slow learners are motivated by giving them advice after class hours, providing additional learning material, such as additional notes and set of question papers of previous exams. The advanced learners encouraged to take part in active items such as quizzes, essay writing, debates and other competitions etc. Internet facilities are made available to students.

The creative abilities of students are given vent through wall papers college magazines. A friendly environment is created to improve the communication skills of the advanced learners. A number of motivational lectures are organized to channelize their potential to achieve success. The students belonging to economically weaker sections are being incorporated in 'Student Adoption Scheme' of the college where they get some financial assistance.

2.3 Teaching-learning process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize to teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic Calendar, Teaching Plan, Evaluation, Blue Print etc.)

In the beginning of each academic year, the academic calendar is released by the affiliating University which is to be followed by our college. The same academic calendar is published in the college in prospectus and college website before the beginning of the session of every academic year. It provides plan for the academic year to students, teachers and parents. Each department functions according to the teaching plan prepared at the department level. The unit wise syllabus is discussed with the faculty of the department. The faculty follows instructions regarding teaching learning process so that the institutional objectives to be achieved. The various kinds of aids and the equipments are used inside the classroom.

A copy of the teaching plan is submitted to the Principal. Time table is prepared and displayed on the notice board. The department also carry out internal assessment based on students test performance and punctuality as per rules of university. The final evaluation of students is done according to the University evaluations of the examination results are declared and marks sheets are issued by the affiliating University.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

The IQAC imparts knowledge through team work at relentless efforts. It promotes the research and consultancy to faculty members. It also ensures timely, efficient and progressive performance of academic, administrative and financial tasks. The committee always promotes the faculties from the college to participate in various seminars, workshops, conferences and provide various data for the submission of research papers of the various journals and periodicals. Apart from this, the IQAC collects the PPT and GD and other activities arranged by the various department. The committee organized one-day workshop on "NAAC Methodology" for college faculties. The resource person Prof. Mundhe D.B. (Coordinator, NAAC, Sharda College, Parbhani) was addressed the staff of the college. The committee also organized PPT presentation of Refresher Course, Orientation Course, Special Summer School Programme and Short Term Courses attended faculties. It resulted in having the additional benefits of various topics to other faculties who didn't attend such courses.

This cell monitors promotion, implementation and continuous improvement of innovations in curriculum, co-curricular and Extra- curricular activities of the institution. The IQAC works towards the enhancement of teaching learning process

2.3.3How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skill like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

Our college offers lot of support services to the teachers for making the learning student-centric. The college provides library which contain latest books and journals which the faculty uses efficiently to provide comprehensive and latest information to the students. Students are also encouraged to use library independently that enhances their knowledge. Apart from this, college provides a seminar hall where student participate in group discussion, debates and seminars. The college also encourages the use of internet and computers by the staff and students to keep them update for the latest developments in their respective field of study. The library provided the password to all faculties for the access of the various national and international journals available on N-List, INFLIBNET software of college.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

The college concentrates on making the student thinkers and well ideologists for the coming period. To encourage the artistic and studious temper among the students the college teachers motivate them to participate in various events like university youth festival, Avishkar Research Festival, debate competitions, annual gathering, group discussions and other fruitful activities from the college. At the same time to encourage the scientific temper among students, the faculty engages the students in various practical works like writing projects, survey of "The poor vegetable sellers from Sonpeth". To sharpen the overall thinking of students we publish the poems, articles and other written materials through the Wallpapers, Annual Magazines and students involves in Group discussion, debates etc. in which they explore new ideas and also get a chance to listen to the expert views of eminent persons/professionals from the programmes like Carrier and Counseling Cell. We insist the scientific temper among them by prompting them to prepare research projects and participate in various competitions.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Example: Virtual laboratories, e-learning-resources from National programme on Technology Enhanced learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

The use of modern multimedia teaching aid like, OHP, LCD projector, internet, tape recorder, T.V. set are usually deployed in classroom. The students can achieve new learning experiences among their friends and teachers. The students are also encouraged to use computer laboratory with internet connectivity.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

College conducts lectures and seminars by experts on various issues in which faculty members and students are encouraged to participate and reap benefits. The teachers go for refresher. orientation and short term their courses to update knowledge. Educational/industrial/laboratories/historical tours are also arranged. Over the past many years, faculty has been participating in the conferences and presenting papers in regional, state, national and international level seminars. The college organized Two Day National Seminar on "Socio-Economic Growth of BPL Classes: Issues and Challenges" with the support of ICSSR, New Delhi. Some of the faculty members enrolled themselves in M.A. Subject Communication under distance learning programme of YCMOU, Nashik.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students/benefited) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advice) provided to students?

There is a provision for counseling /advising to the needy students for academic and personal guidance. It is done at all level of courses in all the division. The teacher in- charge carefully monitors the regularity of attendance, participation in seminars and other activities and also the performance of the students in internal tests/ semester examinations. The competitive examinations were conducted by Carrier and Counseling Cell under the guidance of the scholar teachers of the cell. Apart from this, the cell displays the various employment opportunities, articles, advertisements and other needful on the notice board of the college. Each faculty fond out the week students in the class and help accordingly wherever necessary.

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

The college encourages the teacher to keep themselves abreast of the latest development in their respective fields. The teachers are being sent to refresher and orientation courses to update their knowledge. They are encouraged to use computers, internet and library resources to enrich their teaching. College library has e-resource facility where each faculty has his/her unique password to access N-List e-journals. The college faculty also provided training to prepare PPT so that they can employ the modern teaching aid in their classrooms. From time to time the college faculty adopts approaches/methods such as

seminar, Group discussion, Presentation and special lectures. The faculty members are encouraged to participate in regional, state, national & international level seminar. The faculty members who attend such seminar /conferences share their experience with students and faculty with latest information and talent development. The Student can easily cope with the hard topics of the curriculum with the help of the Power Point Presentation by the faculties of the college.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

The library continues to provide the following current awareness services in order to alert users to latest information of their interest.

- * List of new entries.
- * Useful articles.
- * News items.

The catalogues from different publishers are filed. Head of department can order for books from these catalogues. The range of subjects is represented by the library collection reflect our institution ever growing zest for new areas of study and research. Some faculty members have their personal collection of books and they share the books with colleagues. Students are also encouraged to make use of library services. They are provided with library card which enables them to set books issued from the library. Students are also taken to the library to instill reading habits among them. Some faculty members donate reference books to library from their personal collections.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

Usually the faculty members complete curriculum within the stipulated time frame. The college teachers manage successfully to deliver their responsibilities. When such situation arises, teachers conduct extra classes to overcome these challenges. The IQAC keeps a check on the syllabus covered by the various departments on regular basis.

IQAC through interaction with faculty members submit reports of the feedback to the Principal. The feedback from students and teachers is useful to monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning. Principal of the college annually takes the feedback from students. This feedback in turn is communicated to faculty with suggestions if any.

The institute follows the rules and regulations given by State Govt. of Maharashtra, Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded and UGC. The college is always ready to recruit qualified teachers. The college seeks the permission for recruitment; teachers are filled by the procedure as follows. First of all, the institute takes permission from Joint Director of higher education and then from university with reservation criteria. After this, advertisement is given in national / state level news papers. After getting applications in response to these, the eligible candidates are scrutinized. Thereafter the college applies to the affiliating University for a panel of expert to conduct the interview. Call letters are issued to qualified candidates for interview. This expert panel consists of the following members.

* Three subject experts deputed by Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded in which two VC nominees.

- * Principal of the college.
- * President of the college management committee. Or a person nominated by management.
- * Govt. nominee.
- * HOD if available.

The above said committee conducts the interview as per the guidelines issued by the Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded and select the eligible and most competent candidates. Preference is given to the candidates having Ph.D. After giving them the appointment letters, the approval is sought from the university. To retain available staff, they are paid salaries according to the rules & regulations by Govt. of Maharashtra &UGC. Presently the college has following qualified faculties.

* Teaching learning methods/ approaches

The college encourages teachers to prepare teaching learning materials mostly the using software's and other electronics tools. The college has licensed software such as Soul 2.0, Mater Software for Office and Tally for commerce students. College also support by providing infrastructural support. The faculties & students use computers, OHP & LCD projector.

* Handling new curriculum

The college has experienced & qualified staff to handle the new curriculum effectively. Some of our faculty members are board members in Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded. They play a vital role in framing the new curriculum. Whenever there is a change in the syllabus initiated by SRTMU, Nanded, the same is conveyed to the HODs /faculty by the Principal. Heads of Departments of our college, informally meet the member of Board of Studies and HODs of other college to discuss the changes in curriculum. The faculty members study the new syllabus to implement in the classrooms. Our Principal and HOD of the department of English Dr. Satpute V.D. is among the Editors of the BA, B. Com. and B. Sc. FY English Compulsory books titled *'The Prism'* and *'The Spectrum'*.

Dr. Misal M.K. published the book 'History of Dalit Movements in Marathwada' which is the reference book for B.A.S.Y. students.

Dr. Shinde B.R. from the Department of the Commerce published two books titled Advance Auditing & Principals of Auditing for the curriculum of B. Com. T. Y. of SRTMU, Nanded. Dr. Patil M.B. has published the Textbook of Botany as syllabus book for B. Sc. F.Y. & B. Sc. S.Y. students of SRTMU, Nanded.

* Selection, development and use of enrichment materials

The teachers of our institute are given free access to internet. This helps them collect learning material from the internet. College has a well-developed library which contains number of books on various subjects. Teachers access e-journals under N-List of INFLIBNET.

* Assessment

The performance based appraisal system is the major yard stick for the promotion of the faculty. It gives picture of the needs of the faculty in terms of their research & other activities. The performance based appraisal system records the annual performance of the teachers to improve the academic system.

* Cross cutting issues

The cross cutting issues like gender, climate change, environment education ,human right, ICT etc. find an ample space when it comes to applying them positively into the curriculum. College celebrates '*Vidyapeeth Vardhapan Saptah*' with the support of the NSS

department. In this *Saptah* (the week), the college arranges various competitions such as essay competition, debate competition, elocution competition, handwriting competition etc. Through such activities we shape the personalities of the students.

* Audio Visual Aids/multimedia

Lectures are taken using Audio Visual Aids in classroom. Faculty members are provided Internet browsing facility for preparation of teaching /learning materials.

* OER's (Open Educational Resources)

Teachers are requested to develop and share their notes and teaching materials with other teacher through the hard copies and the same is also shared with the students. Some faculty members have their personal collection of books and they share the books with colleagues as well as teachers of the other institution. The department also invites various resource persons from other colleges.

We have organized the Two Days Interdisciplinary National Seminar on 28 & 29 March 2014 on the topic 'Socio Economic Study of BPL Classes: Issues and Challenges" in association with ICSSR, New Delhi.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external peers? If yes, how is the evolution used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

Yes, our institute gets evaluation of the teachers done by students and external peers. The head of the institution takes feedback of the teachers from the students. At the end of every academic year students give feedback of each faculty members on their teaching skills in a prescribed format. The feedback mainly focuses on the various teaching skills of the faculty members like presentation, healthy interaction, and content covered, and learning resources use of teaching aids. If any faculty doesn't meet the benchmark on feedback, he/she is counseled for the future. The faculty is communicated in written the strong and weak points and suggested to make necessary changes.

2.5 Evaluation process and reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

The stakeholders of the institution i.e. students and faculty members and even the parents of the students are informed about evaluation process by giving general instructions mentioned in the prospectus of the institution. The instructions issued by the parent university are promptly communicated to the students. The faculty members read the instructions even in the classrooms and copy of the same is also displayed on the student's notice-board. They are informed about criterion of the internal assessment, practical exams etc.

The evaluation is an integral part of teaching learning process. So college makes effective arrangements for the smooth application of the rules about the evaluation process. Examination cell of the institute is responsible for conducting various evaluation

programmes. The college has developed a proper mechanism for this purpose. Time to time staff meetings are also conducted, concerning evaluation process.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

The students are evaluated by group discussions, seminars and some times, by written test. It makes the evaluation more interesting for students. Faculty members also try new innovation in their teaching skill to make evaluation more correct and beneficial for the students. The college has adopted various university reforms concerning evaluation viz. same pattern of MCQ question papers are used in test examination. Internal assessment is awarded to the students as per the university criteria. Unit test of TY students are conducted to evaluate the performance of students. Student-centric learning is applying through assignments, projects and practical sessions.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The evaluation reforms of the University are followed in the best of the spirit. The evaluation is all fair, student are satisfied by showing them the evaluated performance in the answer sheets. Any doubt about evaluation is made clear to the students. All record is maintained i.e. answer sheet, award list etc by the examination department. Whenever class test and common test are taken the results of the student's performance / awards are shown to the students to encourage them or counsel them for better future performance. The institution follows improvements in examination system suggested by Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded from time to time.

Formative assessment

The goal of formative assessment is to monitor student's learning, Feedback is taken to improve teaching and learning progress. Formative assessment of the student is done on the following parameters.

Summative assessment

The goal of the summative assessment is to evaluate student learning at the end of session /semester. For the summative approaches common tests are conducted in the college. From these tests the students get clear idea to improve their performance for final examination. This is the formative & summative evaluation approaches in the college.

Academic performance, regularity, participation, in co-curricular and extracurricular activities, physical & emotional issues etc. plays a vital role in the progress of the students. The following monitoring methods are adopted by the institution. The academic performance is monitored by observing the students' performance in classroom through discussion, interaction and assignment. Monitoring is also done by observing their performance in the internal examinations and final annual examinations taking both theoretical and practical aspects into considerations. The answer books are shown and supplied to the students. Common test is also conducted in the month of February for students which are helpful for final examinations. The regularity of the students is monitored by recording presence /absence in every class. The parents are informed through the letter or even telephonically (about absentee, weak students). After identifying their areas of interest in co-curricular and extracurricular activities the students' participation / non- participation is recorded.

All the staff members continually involved in student's physical &emotional issues through continue counseling and offer help whenever necessary. Parent & local guardians are invited to the college to discuss the progress of their wards on parents meeting day.

2.5.6. The internal assessment is made by the faculty member keeping in mind the following aspects/factors of student's performance during the academic year.

- 2 Unit test/common test
- 3 Response in the examinations

In spite of all the above aspects of the students their behavioral aspect, independent learning and communication skill and other hidden talents etc. are also taken in to consideration during the assessment of a student. Apart from this, the college gives "The Best Student Award" to the students who is regular, sincere, topper in the examination as well as his/her active participation in the various activities organized by the college.

Yes. The institution uses assessment and evaluation both as an indicator for evaluating student's performance. The students who excel in the academic, sports or extracurricular activities are given due advantage in assessment. General classroom behavior, active participation in college activities of the students is also kept in mind when evaluation of a student is undertaken. With this analysis by the institution and individually teachers does the analysis of the stakeholders and the student is selected for the 'The Best Students Award' of the year.

The student has free access to the subject teacher. The students having grievances regarding evaluation process or every doubt is made clear by showing his performance in the answer sheets.

University examination

With regard to university examination there is a mechanism adopted by the University for redressal of grievances within 15 days after the announcement of the results. Students can apply for re-evaluation/ re-counting. Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded makes arrangement for issuing photocopies of their answer scripts to the students after application submitted by the claimant.

Library attendance register is maintained to know student's interest in reading, and to develop the reading habits. The faculty members conduct debate, essay competition, to monitor the academic progress of students.

We have career counseling & guidance cell in our college which communicates from time to time with the other agencies/offices for the conduction of guest lectures. Through this cell, guidance has been given to students about employment opportunities in Govt./Private sectors.

The institute has a consultancy cell, which includes the experts of all the departments, those counselors provide guidance to select the appropriate stream in which they are having interest and bright future.

The major strength of this college is it is trying to ensure the holistic development to make them good citizens. The institution established to provide knowledge and value based education to all segments of society. The institute is conscious of its role in campus-community connection, well being of its neighborhood and has initiated a number of community development activities. The institution collaborately organized blood donation camps & always motivates for the participation in the blood donation camps. Involvement of the faculty, students and neighboring institute for raising various issues like rally of relief funds, issues like female feticide. The college is organizing NSS camp with assistance of local Regional Gram Panchayat, Village and Council.

The institute is committed to attract students for participating in various social activities by ensuring consistent encouragement and motivation. The institute has motivated the students to maintain plastic free campus by banning the use of plastic in the campus Environment awareness campaign conducted by NSS department. Plantation conducted in the month of June and July by NSS department in campus. Medical check-up camp organized for students. We provide basic computer education to our support staff and students. Students actively participate in Pulse Polio programme and other vaccinations programmes.

Aids awareness programme- On the occasions of the birth centenary and death anniversary of national leaders & social reformers, the programmes as like elocution competition, debate competitions and essay writings has been arranged by various department of the college. Some students are being sent to the debate competitions organized by various colleges, and universities with help of the Cultural Department. For last two years, our two students from NSS participating in Varkari Deendi from Alandi to Pandharpur. Through this social activity, the students spreads the various messages like AIDS, water conservation, to the varkaris in he Dindi. The college organized the antyranging awareness programme with the help of Sonpeth Taluka Judiciary Committee where Sonpeth Taluka magistrate Hon. Kadam addressed to the students about the ragging laws. With the help of Panchayat Samiti, Sonpeth the students of our college presented the play 'Mi Gramsevak Boltoy'. The NSS students were actively participated in "The Weapons Day" organized by Sonpeth Police Station in which API Kapkar has given the knowledge to the students about how to handle weapons. The NSS also runs 'The Red Ribbon club' by which the department spreads the awareness about the blood donation. These activities help students to grow with social responsibilities and establish harmony.

3.6.3 How does the institution solicit stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality of the institution?

The mission and objectives of the college are prominently displayed in the Prospectus given to the students at the time of admission. The college website provides adequate space to this mission. They find place in all the offices of the college, library and other major buildings of the college. Immediately after admission, the students are made aware of these mission and objectives. The institute has evolved a stakeholder's web by forming different platform like Research Committee, Alumni with a fair representation of students. The IQAC in the planning process considers feedback collected from the entire stakeholder to prepare perspective on development. These developments prospective will be discussed in there sportive committee. The reflection of the meeting will be incorporated in the plan. Institute is highly concerned with its stakeholder i.e. includes students, parents, staff, alumni. 'Student Adoption Scheme & Student Help Fund' is funding students from poor family and socially backward classes who can't pay their tuition fees or any other fees. With the help of this scheme students get some relief and he/she could complete the degree without breaking his

/her education. Sometimes we also help their relatives by collecting fund. Above all, the institution provided school uniforms to the needy students.

Students:

We value the opinions and needs of our students. One student of each class nominated as representative. He/ She communicate student's requirements and problems to the respective teacher/head of department/ Principal. Suggestion/Complaint box placed in the campus, which is accessible to students. Students have the freedom to approach the Principal during working hours without prior appointment.

Parents:

Teacher/head of department/Principal interact with guardians. They are informed about their wards academic performance and attendance records through meetings, letters and phone calls. Direct interaction of the guardians with the H.O.D. is also encouraged. Opinions of parents are considered with respect to various aspects. Parents are allowed to meet the teachers, Coordinators and Principal on any day of the week at any time to make any suggestions or complaints.

Staff:

We have regular staff meetings to keep the staff updated about changes and developments of the institute. Most of the decisions are taken only after consultation with the staff during staff meeting.

Alumni:

We have constituted an alumni association with a Professor In-Charge. The association organizes meetings and has regular formal and informal interactions where in any alumni is free to give his/her suggestions.

The management actively offers help when any infrastructural change is required. Since present infrastructure is not adequate, the institution has travel long in this regard.

b) Extracurricular activities – sports, outdoor and indoor games, gymnasium, NSS cultural activities, Public speaking, communication skill development, health and hygiene etc.

The college is endowed with excellent physical infrastructure facilities to support the teaching – learning process. The main campus is spread over 2 acres of Land. A master plan has been prepared for the campus. Our college has spacious multipurpose hall, adequate number of classrooms, few chambers well equipped laboratories. The college has a separate block for administration. The library is with adequate space, large numbers of books and journals, internet, e-journal accession and other support facilities.

a. CURRICULAR AND CO-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

I Classrooms – Classrooms with approximately 400 Sq. ft. with proper light arrangement and ventilation. There is sufficient number of windows which provide natural light so the classroom hardly needs artificial lights. Our college has special ladies room for staying girls in the college.

II Technology Enabled learning facility – The College has separate provision of OHP, LCD projector, DTH facility and broad band internet connection. Common room for girls and woman faculty member is also available in college. The college has a canteen to serve food and refreshment to staff, students and guests.

III) Seminar hall – The College has one seminar hall, which is regularly used for conducting seminar & cultural programmes, work shop and various academic programmes.

IV) Laboratories: The College has 3 laboratories i.e. Chemistry, Zoology and Botany to conduct the regular practical of the students.

VI) Specialized facilities and equipment, available for teaching, learning and research

The college has established well equipped 30 computers. The ratio of computer and student 1:25. The staff and students are given free access to internet so that they can enrich their knowledge and then in turn the students can benefit from their experience and knowledge.

b) EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

- **Sports** In sports, our college provides indoor and outdoor games to students. Our college facilitates 12 station gyms like spine bike, manual jogger, vibrating massager, and multipurpose bench, weightlifting rod- Plates, dumbbells, cycle to the college students.
- **Indoor games-** Facilities for the sport like, chess, carom, Table Tennis etc are provided to the students in the college.
- **Outdoor games** A specious half acre play ground is available for outdoor games i.e. Kabaddi, Kho-Kho, Athletics, Volleyball, and Badminton in college campus. The play ground is existed for outdoor games.
- **N.S.S.** College has one N.S.S. unit of 100 students. The Various socially relevant services are provided by N.S.S. students, like participation in blood donation camp, and rallies are organized on the various issues like female foeticide. The students also participate in pulse polio programme. Seven days special programme is organized at nearby villages where rural are awakened with different programmes.
- **Cultural Activities** The College has been regularly participating in the university level youth festivals. The students have been participating in all academic, theatrical and musical activities. The college also organizes the annual gathering where students get opportunities to expose their hidden talent through various events.
- **Public speaking communication and skill development** –Personality development programmes are run by the college which involves various activities like public speaking and communication development etc. Besides this, the college faculties keep on enriching, the students with communication skill under Career Oriented Programme.

• Health and hygiene – In addition to above mentioned activities; our college has a very special concern for the health hygiene of the college students, staff and other members. The college organizes medical checkup camps.

Right now no admission of girl students is enrolled. The college campus is on walking distance from hostel. All facilities are available in hostel.

✓ 2.Recreation Facilities

The college has open space for outdoor recreation and audiovisuals aids TV, and DTH etc. for indoor recreation. Our college has canteen in the college campus.

✓ 3.Computer Facility, Library and Hygiene Facility

The hostel is situated in the college campus itself, computer laboratory, internet facility, library, magazine and newspaper, first aid box and other hygiene facilities like water cooler with RO water filters are used from institutional building.

✓ 4.Security

For proper security, a peon is appointed to night shift.

These students are provided every possible help during their stay in the college. As it is stated earlier, our college is situated in rural area. Majority students are from S.C., S.T. and O.B.C. category. The central Govt., State Govt., and open merit scholarship and concessions are given to such students in the college. Apart from this each college faculty contribute Rs.500/ per year for the 'Student Welfare Fund' from which we can provide the proper help to the needy students of the college. Our institution runs the 'Student Adoption Scheme' by which every teacher adopts the economically weak student of the college. By the adoption of the student, we provide books; remit college fees, bus concessions as well as dresses to the needy students. Apart from this, the President of the institute Shri Kadam P.R. provided the dresses for the economically weak student of the college.

> Students with physical disabilities

There is reservation for students belonging to differently- abled category or physically challenged students as per UGC notifications. The college ensures that infrastructure facilities meet the requirement of the students with physical disabilities; it is ensured that they don't have any physical obstruction. Such students are given extra attention during the college examination as well as in the final examination.

Our college has special concern for the health & hygiene. The college organized blood group checkup, through N.S.S. unit. In order provide basic facilities, proper arrangement of drinking water attached with RO water is present. First aid box arrangement is made available by the institution. In any emergency case, the college is just half kilometer away from the Rural Hospital of Sonpeth. The medical officers from rural hospital co-operate with the institute staff in such cases.

> Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams

In order to strengthen the students for competition examinations we have career counseling & guidance cell. Through this cell guest Lecturers and guidance programmes are arranged for the students.

> Skill development (spoken English, computer literacy, etc.,)

The college regularly conducts personality Development Programmes which enhance the IQ Level and communication skills of students. OSince communication in English is obligatory everywhere it is prerequisites for employment in many fields. We have introduced (COP) communication skill in English. To get basic computer knowledge among the students we have free access to computers. Institution has computerized laboratories with internet facilities. The college has COP programme for the development of the spoken English.

Publication of student magazines

The college published its annual magazine '*Pradnya*'. The students of the college very enthusiastically contribute with their articles in the magazine. The college magazine is printed in the supervision of the college editorial board. The students participated in this magazine with their short stories, poems and articles etc. Faculty members also contributed in the magazine. The staff is always eager to find the hidden talent and creativity of students. The various **Department Study Circles** of the college published wall posters from their department with their thoughts and other things from the current issues of the state and nation.

5.1.8 What type of counseling services are made available to the students (academic, personal, career, psycho-social etc.)

The Career Counseling and Guidance cell is working in our college. The teacher in charge is available to guide the job opportunities/employments. They can share their problems with the teacher. The teachers are very supportive in guiding them to fight their problems. The teachers make it sure that no such bad or worse happens with the psycho-social understanding of the students. They are counseled to become better human being and advised to stand strong for the social cause.

Till date no such case of sexual harassment has been reported in the institution. The strict punishment provisions and prevents sexual harassment of student are informed to the student through the meetings. For the awareness of the sexual harassment rules, our college invited Taluka Judge and API of the Sonpeth Police station for the guidance to the students. With this, the government of Maharashtra runs '*Jagar Janiwancha Abhiyan*' for awareness of the sexual harassment of the female gender. Apart from this, the college premise is under CC TV by which the Principal of the college observing the activities of the students, staff and visitors.

5.1.12 Is there an anti-ragging committee? How many instances (if any) have been reported during the last four years and what action has been taken on these?

Yes. The Anti Ragging Committee is working in the college. Ragging means the violations of human rights. The UGC has made it mandatory for the Institution to incorporate in their prospectus the anti ragging directions of the Central Government. The college is very cautious regarding all ragging issues. It comprises of the Head of the Institution and faculty members. The anti ragging committee assigned to check the students, make surprise visit, and make the interaction with fresh students. The Principal of the Institution visits the campus and classes to check any kind of harassment of students or any other issues in the college. We organize 'Welcome Fresher's' programme to welcome fresher students. In these programme fresh students introduces themselves and try to make good relationship with their senior students. Till date, no incident of ragging of any kind has been reported in the college.

5.1.13 Enumerate the welfare schemes made available to students by the institution.

The institution is working towards social justice through various students' welfare schemes. The induction programmes clearly presents the welfare schemes available to the students. Scholarship and free ships received from various Central, State and other agencies are made available to the students. Details about scholarship and free ships others and particular related about scholarship are displayed on the notice board. The clerk who maintains the records of the scholarship gives all the relevant information to the students at the time of admission as well as in the classes too. The college also provides free ships (EBC) on the basis of their, economical conditions and in the other considered issues. The queries and complaints in this regard are being sorted out by scholarship committee.

Career Counseling and Guidance Cell :

The institution has career counseling &guidance cell. The cell comprises of 3 members. The cell conducted programmes, to give knowledge about career advancement and job opportunities. The cell displays all job opportunities on notice boards and counsels students.

Grievance Redressal Cell :

We ensure the safety and dignity of the female students to the college students in classrooms. We have set up grievance redressal cell. Through this cell, problems are always discussed and solved. It attends to both registered and unregistered grievances of the students. Apart from this, the complaint come suggestion box is being put for handling the issue effectively.

> Question Bank :

Another innovation is that we prepare question bank which has help to remove the burden of students and it also helps to improve success rate in the final examination. Faculty members provide one copy of question bank to the library.

> The Prize Distribution & Best Student of the Year Award :

The prize distribution programme is organized to inspire students in the inaugural function of the *Annual Gathering*. The college has started **'The Best Student Award'** for the regular and sincere as well as academically toppers from the every stream of the college. The college teachers also encourage the students by declaring the toppers from the subjects of the college respectively. In the name of each faculty, we have award in specific subject which is given to the toppers.

Student Adoption Scheme :

The college teachers have started 'The Student Adoption Scheme'. Every faculty from the college adopts at least one economically weak but regular as well as sincere students from his/her branch or subject respectively.

The college has Alumni Association, but it is not yet registered. The college has formed an Alumni Association under the leadership of Alumni Committee. Above all, our college Language Study Circle, Social Science Study Circle, Science Study Circle, Commerce Study Circle and NSS, Cultural Department time to time publishes various **Wall Papers** on the birth anniversaries, death anniversaries and on other occasions in every academic year.

Language Study Circle, Social Science Study Circle, Science Study Circle, Commerce Study Circle and NSS, Cultural Department time to time publishes various **Wall Papers** on the birth anniversaries, death anniversaries and other occasions in every academic year forms the Editorial Boards which comprises the students representatives such as Editor, Co-Editor, Secretary Treasurer & members. The Board invites writing from students and teachers and publishes their articles, in the form of wall papers. This activity totally is done by student under the guidance of the Head /Teachers of respective Study Circles.

• Subject Study Board:

There are four study circles i.e. Language Study Circle, Social Sciences Study Circle, Commerce Study Circle and Sciences Study Circle which comprise an Editor, Co-editor, Secretary, Treasurer and five to seven student members. The various activities are run by this board such as wallpaper publication, essay competition etc. Apart from this, the guests are invited to share their valuable thoughts on the particular subject.

• Library Committee:

We have formed the library committee which includes Principal as the Chairman; Librarian is the Secretary and five professors and two student members. The committee advises to purchase various books, journals, e-Journals, periodicals, News Papers and grants for the development of the library.

• Anti Ragging Committee:

We have established anti ragging committee where the Principal is the head of the committee. The Teacher Representatives and the representative of the student's organization, parent representative, and N.S.S. representative are existed in the committee. The Committee Members and physical director works as the members in committee.

• N.S.S. Committee:

The principal is the president of N.S.S. committee. Other two senior lecturers that are interested in the social activities are working as the **Programme Officers** of the unit, two college students one from boys and one from girl students.

• Student Welfare Committee:

Two students and the senior faculties are involved in the committee which communicates with the universities about the various activities of the Student Welfare Department.

• Publication Committee:

Two student and the senior faculties are involved in the committee which actively participates in various publications i.e. College Magazine and Wall papers by the departments.
• Cultural Committee:

6.1 Institutional vision and leadership

The institution, Late Ramesh Warpudkar Arts & Commerce College, Sonpeth has its rich history. The town had a significant place in the reign of Nizam of Hydrabad. After independence the town has lost its historical importance. Till 1994, it was far away from the main currents of the society. The students of the region had no alternative for having higher education. Taking this need of the society into consideration, our visionary leader late Rajabhau D. Kadam, founder member of the institution, initiated and started senior college for the masses in the region. He desired that the people of this rural area should have higher education with open access system, irrespective of caste, color and creed. In order to give higher education to rural/backward youth institution is making continuous efforts since its inception.

Vision:

"Reaching to the Unreached."

Mission:

"To offer opportunities of the empowerment to the rural learners by imparting quality higher education within the capacities."

Objectives:

- To strive for imparting higher education to rural masses in genera and girls in particular.
- To seek socio-cultural transformation of rural youths.
- To inculcate the values like national integration, patriotism, liberty, equality, fraternity, humanity and tolerance among youths.
- To nurture the quality of social and civil responsibilities among the students.
- To create youths capable to be employed.

6.1.2. What is the role of top management, Principal, and faculty in designing and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

The institution is governed by Hanuman Shikshan Prasarak Mandal, Sonpeth. The management, the principal and the staff are always stepping together for designing and proper

application of the quality policy and plans. The principal of the college is the head of the institution and is always eager to provide requisite leadership to the system. The principal takes care to follow university circulars, by laws, the statutes and the regulations framed from time to time. In the beginning of each academic year, a meeting of LMC is held where annual planning is made and same is being communicated to faculty. Most of the time, President of the management, Principal and all teaching and non teaching employees sit together and discuss on various issues. He also conveys meetings of the advisory committee, various other bodies and whenever necessary directions to carry out and give effect to the decision of the said bodies. Importantly the principal provides academic growth. The faculty actively involves in decision making process. The teachers hold meetings. The recommendations of the committee are submitted to the principal. The management arrives at suitable decisions for implementation. Hence they are actively involved in the decision making process to sustain and enhance quality education imparted by the institution.

6.1.3 What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring?

The management encourages the participation of the staff in the process of decision making in institutional functioning. The college has constituted different committees of teachers and members of the nonteaching staff which play vital role in planning and implementation of activities of institution. The personal interaction of the principal with various stake holders, the faculty, the non teaching staff, the students, the guardians play an important role in this. Apart from this, the information available in student's feedback forms and information available in self-appraisal forms of teachers help the management to plan the proper support for the policies. The principal is the head of the institution and he bears the ultimate responsibility for the smooth running of the college. The role of the principal of the college is multi dimensional. As a head of the institution, the principal is responsible for both the academic and administrative functioning of the college. He prepares the agenda for governing body meetings. He places academic and administrative matters before the LMC for approval. He is responsible for executing all decisions. He is also responsible for all correspondence with the governing body, S.R.T.M University Nanded, Govt. of Maharashtra, Central Govt. and UGC. The principal maintains the reports from various college committees. He offers advice & suggestions in terms of functions. In this way principal motivates the teaching and non-teaching faculty of institution.

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

The principal of the institution has powers to govern the institution according to the rules and regulations of Management, Govt. of Maharashtra, UGC and parent University. In the beginning of the academic year, IQAC conducts the meeting with staff. By taking into consideration the potential and creativity of each person, the responsibilities and duties are being allotted. For the smooth functioning, principal with the consent of the governing body and discussion with IQAC, official notices are issued. The committee prepares action plan and submits to the principal for its approval. At the end of the session/ semester the committee submits the report about work done, to the head of institution. All these activities are monitored and evaluated by IQAC. The teaching faculty and non teaching faculty are being informed about their duties and responsibilities through meetings, and written notices.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

The Management of the college is in constant touch with head of the institution and has an amicable support with the head of the institution. In the institution the members of the Management Committee meet frequently and the problems and issues related to college development, administration, appointment and infrastructural needs and student disciplines are discussed. In Local Management committee meeting, head of the institute and some staff members nominated by the management are also present to provide information and suggestions if any. In the meetings the responsibilities are defined and communicated to the staff through the head of the institution. If the situation demands, the President of the Management Committee holds meeting with the teachers to communicate directly and bestows the responsibilities. The teaching as well as the non-teaching and supporting staff follows instructions and obey the orders in the interest of the institution.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

The Management is always encouraging and supporting the involvement of the staff in the improvement of the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional process. The management through the head of the institution involves the staff members in various activities related to the development of the college. The staff members are involved by way of formation of various committees such as building committee, advisory committee, discipline committee, examination committee etc. The representatives of teaching and non teaching employees are being appointed on the local management committee who actively participate in decision making process. For the best working of committees principal always motivates the staff members involved in committees. The management and principal of the college prompt faculties to fill their nomenclatures in various elections of university. All these activities help faculties to groom leadership at various stages.

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

A decentralized functioning of institution empowers the quality of institution in all aspects. Faculty members participate in every activity and action plan. The principal conducts regular meetings with teaching & non-teaching staff. For the effective implementation, suggestions/opinions from all members are always welcomed. Departmental meetings are taken in consultation with teaching / non teaching faculty. These decisions are reviewed by higher authorities /committees in case of needs. At the beginning of academic year various committees are being formed and each committee is being empowered to execute their action plan. These various committees help us to decentralize the governance. NSS, Cultural, Sports etc. departments have such authority.

6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If "YES" indicate the levels of participative management?

The institution can proudly boast of a participative management. The management actively takes part in the working of the institution. The head of the management is in the leading role in governance and management of the institution. He, along with the other members of the committee keenly observes the day to day working of the college administration, governance, management and academic activities. He inspires the staff members in staff meeting and by personal interaction to give their best in their teaching assignment. He communicates to the teachers, decision taken by the management and ensures that all the points are implemented properly. He is responsible to constitute different committees involving the staff members. He looks after the financial expenditure and manages the fund for the different developmental activities taking place at the campus.

6.2. Strategy Development and deployment

6.2.1 Does the institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

Yes, the college has formally stated, quality policy. A number of steps have been taken to translate quality to its various units by the college. IQAC monitors the activities and plans proposed by various departments for the calendar year. IQAC with regular interval of time takes feedback from every department. The governing council grants permission for the prospective plans prepared for the stake holders. Then it is placed before the teachers, student representatives and administrators for discussion. Then it finalizes and submits to the governing council for scrutiny and implementation. In the academic units teachers are encouraged to participate in seminars, conferences, workshops, Short term courses, conclaves and refreshers/orientation courses to update their knowledge. The faculty has been provided all the latest communication technology for teaching/learning purpose.

6.2.2 Does the institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.

The institution has a perspective plan for its infrastructural and academic growth. The institution has purchased two acres of land and has its own building. As far as the infrastructural growth is concerned we have adequate classrooms, auditorium and playground but we have yet to develop library building, science laboratories and administrative building. The institution has four hundred students and the present infrastructure is adequate for the present strength. We desire to provide qualitative higher education which will provide employment to students. Hence the graduates who are passing from this institution should be enabled with high potential and will be able to face the global competition. In future, the institution desires to begin vocational courses or applied diploma curses introduced by UGC from time to time. It will help students to earn while they are learning. Presently we have career oriented programme in English I.e. Communicative English, which is helping students in one way or other. In future we also intend to begin new courses which will be more useful to students. The perspective institutional plan is developed following the procedure of involving the cooperation of teachers, students and members of the Managing Committee. In order to formulate the strategy of development and deployment, the committees are constituted for each and every developmental work. Teachers have to participate in all the institutional plans and wherever the situation demands, students and members of Management Committee are involved. The meeting of students is summoned to take their participation by means of selection of some students. In the Cultural Committee and Magazine Committee students are involved along with the teachers. In the committees related to infrastructural developments, Principal is chairman and teachers are the members.

6.2.3 Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making processes.

Our parent institution i.e. Hanuman Shikshan Prsarak Mandal governs the following three units: Late Ramesh warpudkar ACS College, Sonpeth, Late Ramesh warpudkar Junior College, Sonpeth and Late Rajabhau Kadam High school Vita Tq. Pathri Dist. Parbhani and Rajabhau Kadam Primary School, Sonpeth. After the selection procedure of a new employee, the president of the governing body issues appointment letters and joining and approval procedure is to be completed by the Principal of the college. The policy decisions taken by the executive council are communicated directly to the principal by written letters and its execution is done through the Principal of the college. L.M.C. oversees the functioning of both the academic and administrative aspects of institution. LMC meets twice a year for discussion of various issues. The principal is the head of the academic and administrative departments of the college. The HODs are in-charge of academic and administrative functioning of the departments. The teaching staff takes care of curricular aspects and keeps a watch on the activities related to co-curricular and extracurricular aspects.

Teaching & Learning

The Management ensures effective and efficient transaction of the teaching learning Process by:

A) Recruiting highly qualified and competent teaching faculty.

B) Promoting professional development of faculty by providing support.

i. To undergo refresher/orientation courses.

ii. To equip themselves in modern pedagogical tools.

iii. To pursue doctoral programmes. Presently out of 25 teaching faculties, we have 14 teachers with Ph. D degrees and 06 have almost completed their research work and 3 have registered themselves for doctoral programmes)

iv. To attend and organize National and International Seminars/conferences.

v. Communicating student feedback to every faculty.

Research & Development

The college has established Research Development Committee to promote Research aptitude among faculty and students.

More than 90% faculties are actively engaged in research activities.

- > As many as 05 teachers are pursuing their Minor Projects.
- > 1 teacher has applied for Major Project.
- > Three teachers are recognized research supervisors.
- Students are prompted to participate in Research Festivals organized by university.
- > The College is planning to have the online journal to promote research environment.

> The Principal has been motivating the faculty to write research projects & apply to UGC etc. for research schemes

Community Engagement

The college has two units of NSS. The college encourages students to take part in NSS and other extension activities. Comprehensive projects are undertaken by the students in collaboration with the community. The college has also established Women Empowerment Cell. The college organizes various outreach programmes to enable the students to respond to the larger issues of society: The College organizes blood donation camp, NSS camps, Student Rallies on the Aids day etc. free medical check-up, youth festivals, Tree plantation festival etc. The college also organizes Awareness Programmes on vital issues like Female Foeticide, Drug Addiction, HIV/AIDS, etc. The surveys like Toilet availability at village level and the socio-economic position of laborers in Sonpeth city are being undertaken by the college.

• Human Resource Management.

There are many staff welfare schemes. We have group insurance called GSLI. The management has provided staff quarters at low rate in the college campus which resulted in strengthening the competence of faculty. Basic computer training is organized for faculty members and students. The institution recruits faculty members and staff based on the guidelines provided by the University. Effective system of A.P.I. of teachers is existed. Communication system with all stake holders is very good.

• Industry Interaction

Faculty members & students from department of commerce organize industrial tours to various industries like; Cotton, sugar. Cloth mill, milk projects etc. Students get the first hand knowledge and learn a lot from these visits. One Day Workshop is being organized on 'Apiculture' for having first hand information of the business of the apiculture.

6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information [from feedback and personal contact etc.] is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

The management and head of the institution are always in interactive mode with each other. The head of institution and Local Management Committee get the feedback from teachers, students and the public with regards to the teaching quality, curriculum, extra curricular activities and infrastructural demands. In the meeting of the Management Committee the information gathered from different sources are discussed with the participating members. After thorough discussion and deliberation the existing facilities and activities of the institution are reviewed and decisions are taken for their implementation after going through the available resources and modalities.

6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional process?

The management is always encouraging and supporting the involvement of the staff in the improvement of the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional process. The management through the head of the institution involves the staff members in various activities related to the development of the college. The staff members are involved by way of constitution of various committees such as Building committee, Admission committee, Advisory committee, Examination committee etc.

The management passed the following resolutions in the meetings of last year:

1 Resolution is passed for the regularization of services of Mr. Andhale B. V.

2 Resolution is passed for the recruitment of the post of Assist professors in English and Librarian.

3 Resolution is passed regarding the interviews of assist professor in botany.

4. The resolved issues were implemented in this year.

5. Resolution is passed to undergo the process of NAAC.

6.2.8 Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If 'yes' what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy yes, the affiliating university.

The University has a provision of status of autonomy but we have not applied for status of autonomy for the institution.

6.2.9 How does the institution ensure that grievances / complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyze the nature of grievances for promoting better stake holder relationship?

The institute has well defined grievance redressal procedure. Prompt and effective disposal of grievances of various stakeholders are being done. Institute has constituted a grievances Redressal committee. This committee discusses the matter with principal to solve the problem. It has been regular practice for the faculty and principal to meet the students in or out the classroom to get their grievances if any. We are very happy to say that no major grievances are reported in last few sessions. Adequate representation is given to female employees on the grievance redressal cell.

6.2.10 During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the court on there.

There is no court cases filed by institute and against the Institute.

6.2.11 Does the institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If 'yes' what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

The institution has a clearly set and defined mechanism of obtaining the feedback from the students to improve the performance and quality of the institutional provisions. Further it is used to improvise the overall competency of the students. Faculty obtains the information of problems of students from the above policy. Good results are gained by the institution in both academic and administrative work. The measures are taken to solve the problems. Feedback form is being taken from the students where students freely state the problems they are facing. The feedback given by the students is in turn communicated to the entire faculty in written and directs them to improve the matters where they are lacking behind. Institution is getting tips/suggestions to improve in all manners through this feedback method.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non-teaching staff?

The management & principal is able to rightly identify faculty members and individual strengths, areas of interest and accordingly assign responsibilities. Responsibilities of every staff are communicated to them through notices that clearly define their role in the implementation of any given assignments. Besides they are also informally counseled so as to make them aware of their duties. The institution promotes professional development of the faculty to the greatest possible extent. Lots of efforts are being made to enhance the professional development of teaching and non-teaching staff. The college promotes the faculty to participate in refresher, orientation, short term, Science conclaves and workshops. Principal encourages them to undertake various research projects in the form of major and minor projects. Faculty members of the institution actively participate in national and international seminars and conferences. The institution encourages faculty members to enroll for orientation, refresher and short term courses and workshops. Some of the faculty members are on the editorial boards of various journals and books. Non-teaching employees are being sent to Pune/ Nanded for professional development programmes and workshops.

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

There are relevant rules in the institution regarding the faculty empowerment. These rules pertain to attending seminars, conferences, refresher and orientation courses, and other training programmes. The need for such training is assessed by the Heads of Departments who recommend Members of the faculty for such programmes. The head of the institution suggests the names of senior faculty who need to be trained for administrative positions when promotions are due. The College has sent proposals for organizing seminars, workshops, and conferences. The CAS benefits are being given to each employee who is eligible for it. At the institutional level, the College Management motivates faculty members through prompt appreciation of exceptional merit and talent and by honoring them at the time of annual gathering.

6.3.3. Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

The achievement of faculty members are monitored and updated in the college records. Performance appraisal system is implemented as per the guidelines from SRTM University Nanded and UGC. The PBAS of faculty is filled by individually on the basis of his/her yearly achievements, discipline, quality etc. The faculty is supposed to submit their self appraisals annually to the Principal. Besides this the assessment of the teachers comes through feedback forms from students which in turn indicate the teacher's quality and expectations. Students are expected to fill the feedback forms for all the teachers concerned with their classes. The feedback forms has a well defined set of questions that helps the student to evaluate the teaching capacity based on lecture understanding and define how far the teacher has succeeded in reaching out to the students. These details are accessible to staff so as to help them to judge their performance.

The principal understands the student reflections and shares it collectively and individually across the staff. If there are any issues of concern, the faculty member is facilitated to overcome the lacunae without lowering self esteem. Wherever required, counseling is

provided to staff in order to help them to improve their professional capabilities. The head of the institution also uses evaluation in an informal way to improve the service of the office staff.

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

The performance appraisal reports duly filled are being assessed by the Principal and management. The Management plays an active role in the performance appraisal of the staff. The management keeps a vigil on the professional behavior and attitude of the members of the teaching as well as the non-teaching faculty. Annual increments and placement in the grades are all implemented under the signatures of the managing committee and due recognition and increments are given to the teachers who have completed their Ph.D. Likewise; the management ensures expeditious implementation of all the benefits after the appraisal of the faculty. The management takes effective decisions and the decisions taken are incorporated in the proceedings of the meetings of the managing committee and Governing Body.

6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and nonteaching staff? What percentage of staff availed the benefits of such schemes in last four years?

The strategies adopted by Govt. of Maharashtra for faculty welfare include career advancement benefits for those with higher qualifications such as Ph.D. as well as opportunities for those who wish to improve their qualifications. Government and affiliating university has implemented following social welfare schemes:

• 10 medical leaves are given to every employee in one academic year.

• There is a provision of maternity leave of six months and paternity leave for 10 days given, if required.

• An insurance policy of LIC namely GSLI is given to the staff members whose premium is automatically deducted from their salaries.

• Provident fund.

• To avail the facility of Loan from various banks, the institution provides all legal documents. Instead of credit society, we have a scheme like small saving group where the employees collect amount monthly and it is being given in the form of loan to those who demand it. All the faculty members are benefited by above said welfare schemes.

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

A lot of measures are taken by the institute for attracting and retaining eminent faculty. A handsome salary is offered to the faculty according to their experience and qualification. The management offers fair treatment to faculty in terms of sharing of administrative responsibilities, and representation in committees. The academic input given

to the entire faculty body makes them appreciative of the academic environment. Periodic revision of pay is done for the management faculty. Their teaching experience prior to being recruited in this college is considered for increment in their pay. Similarly, Ph. D holders get three additional increments. Irrespective of their years of teaching experience, permission is granted for the faculty to pursue their Ph.D. as part-time researchers and they can opt for a six months leave without pay. Service rules are employee friendly and the management faculty feels comfortable with them.

6.4 Financial management and Resource mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The financial resources of the college are managed in a very effective and foolproof manner. Proper accounts are maintained by college through cashbook, ledger and voucher file. Each and every transaction is supported by the vouchers. All the collections are deposited in the bank. Only duly authorized persons can operate through the bank. All expenditure recurring and nonrecurring are incurred through checks. Audit is done by the authorized chartered accountant. For efficient use of financial resources, the budget is prepared in the month of April for next year. All financial matters are supervised by the concerning committee.

6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the measure audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

The accounts of the college are subjected to audit by the external authorized chartered accountant per year. We don't have the internal audit mechanism, but the advisory committee supervises and keeps a check on accounts of the college. Suggestions are given to the accountant in this regard. The joint director office including accounts officer of higher education inspects the audited statements and other financial matters. We have completed the assessment up to financial year 2010-11. No major objections were taken in the assessment.

Internal audit has been accomplished up to Year 2103-14, whereas external audit i.e. audit by J.D. has been up to 2011.

6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipt/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with institutions, if any.

The major sources of funding for college are as follows:

- Total fees collected from the students.
- Grants received from State Govt. for salary only.
- Various grants received from UGC.

• Donation from management members and other donors, etc.

Whenever there is a need of financial assistance, the college demands to management and it is fulfilled by the management from time to time.

Deficit Management

The college receives 95% of the grants-in-aid from the Government of Maharashtra and the rest 5% of the salary of the staff falling under grants-in aid is borne by the management.

6.4.4 Give details on the efforts made by the institution in securing additional funding and the utilization of the same (if any).

The college devises various ways and means to mobilize the resources it needs for the welfare of the students. Some of the methods used by the college towards achieving these goals are given below:

1. The institution has organized intra university N.S.S. youth leadership camps and zonal level sports events. The expenditure for such events is to be partially borne by the affiliating university and partially by the institution.

2. The faculty of the college contributes for the 'student welfare fund' regularly which is used to help sincere and needy students.

3. In collaboration with S.R.T. M. University, Nanded we have organized '*Dr. B.R. Ambedkar Lecture Series*' where we received Rs. 4000/ grants from the university.

Within the existing academic and administrative system the institution has developed mechanisms of its own for the quality assurance. The academic quality of the institution is evaluated on the basis of the performance of the students in their examination. The teachers also judge the student's academic abilities by way of question – answers and written tests. The poor students are helped by the teachers to improve their academic quality by taking extra classes and guidance and providing notes – additional reading material. The administrative system also looks after the quality education in the institutions. The different committees set up by the institutions are always aware to the administrative needs. The Advisory committee, the Examination committee, the Magazine committee, the Finance committee are also constituted and are well equipped for quality assurance of the institution's administration.

The decisions taken by the IQAC are communicated to the management; management in turn communicates their approval in the meetings. The decisions of IQAC like: scheme of 'Student welfare fund', Student feedback, organization of inter university camps, Establishment of Research and Development Cell for enhancement of research etc are being approved by the management. IQAC have the external members on its committee. Since they are the representatives from society, administration and management we are being benefitted by their experience. The alumni also contribute in enhancing the internal quality by making important suggestions in the alumni meet.

The academic and administrative system in the institution has been quite effective to the enhancement of quality education. The institution has full proof mechanism to get the academic and administrative machinery of the institution in motion. The academic quality of the institution is maintained by the teaching and learning process. The administrative quality is maintained by the effective function carried out by the various committees. The two mechanisms are interdependent and therefore, there is no scope for any failure in any System. Head of the institution conducts meeting regularly and visit the class rooms to ensure proper delivery of the material and completion of course as per syllabus in time. The students play a major role in assuring quality of education imparted by the institution. It is through their active participation in classroom that the quality of the education is maintained. The college is trying to make the students punctual and make them to attend class regularly. They approach to the teachers for the solution of their problems related to their syllabus. Their participation is also assured involving them in cultural and other activities. The students also approach to the Head of institution directly for the redressal of their problems. The best practices in the institution have been promoted in full gusto.

In order to improve the functioning of academic and administrative system, the institution has internalized the best practices. The insistence on students' participation in academic and administrative matters has improved the quality of education and

administration in the institution. The administration in institution is maintained by the involvement of staff at every level. The examinations are held quite smoothly by the active participation of the staff. The teachers have been quite supportive to academic needs of the students by offering them reading material and extra classes.

The main task of IQAC being quality assurance, planning and monitoring the projects undertaken, it accomplishes through the following:

- Disseminating information on the various quality parameters of higher Education.
- Reviewing the existing Programmes and introducing new age programmes relevant to the present educational scenario.
- Promoting Research and creating an atmosphere conducive to research.
- Promoting the use of technology for enhanced teaching learning.
- Imparting value based education.
- Documenting the various quality enhancing programmes / activities of the College.
- Consolidating the Feed Back responses from students, parents and other stake Holders.
- Facilitating the academic Audit Committee in creating a learner centric environment conducive for quality education.

The IQAC meetings are conducted after every four months for the planning and implementation of quality enhancement measures and the decisions taken are communicated to the staff and students through in-house meetings of various committees for effective execution.

6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated frame work for quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'Yes' give details on its operationalisation.

'Yes' the institution has adapted three way system where the governing council is the ultimate decision making body accountable to the stake holders. The IQAC, planning body collect references from the learners and various committees through participatory interaction, based on which it proposes comprehensive perspective plan to the LMC for approval and implementation. The heads of committees are in charge of implementation of developmental and academic activities assigned by the LMC. The fair representation of the learners ensures the transparency in the process.

6.5.3 Does the institution provide the training to its staff for effective implementation? Of the quality Assurance producers? If 'Yes' give details enumerating its impact.

The institution ensures that the decisions based on the findings of the IQAC are fully adhered to. The academic as well as the administrative working is further smoothened by deputing the teaching staff to refresher/orientation courses and non teaching staff to professional development programmes at Academic Staff College Pune. Faculty is also deputed to various workshops organized by colleges in the jurisdiction.

6.5.4 Does the institution undertake academic audit or other external review of the academic provision ? If 'yes' how are the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities?

The institution is affiliated with Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded. The University has not its self mechanism to audit the academic working of college. Audit committee is appointed by the University which visits the college and asses the academic performance of the college. It communicates the shortcomings which are to be rectified, corrected by the college till the next visit of the committee. The instructions, rules and regulations strictly followed through processes like adm-ission, examination etc .Notification/ letters are circulated to institution if any change added in the institutional academic process. Similarly if the institution introduces new course/ faculty, University constitutes the affiliation committee to inspect the details. These committees visit the institution, inspects all required aspects about the running of new course/faculty. The college honestly follows the recommendations suggested by these committees.

6.5.5 How is the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/regulatory authorities?

In the case of institution the external regulatory authority is SRTM University, Nanded and we make the compliances as per their needs and requirements.

6.5.6 What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

In the beginning of every academic year, the academic calendar is being prepared. The teaching learning process and other co curricular programmes are being organized as per plan. The IQAC with assistance to other departments monitors the teaching learning process. The process is being reviewed in monthly meetings. The problems, the faculty are confronting are being sorted out in the meetings. The institute's approach to the learning outcome assessment is defined clearly. Faculty is empowered to determine the intended educational outcomes of their academic programmes and activities. The discussion also takes place on the university level examination results. If necessary, the faculty is being advised to improve themselves in the desired area. Faculty use the information collected to develop and improve academic programmes. The institution has a clearly defined, set mechanism to monitor the learning outcomes. Attendance is compulsorily taken by the faculty member and laboratory hours are fixed. Assignments are corrected within a short duration and the marks are entered in register, which acts as a ready reckoner for academic progress of the students. Based on the participation in the class tests, seminar and the marks scored in the assignments, the student level is judged by staff member and appropriate action is taken. Use of L.C.D., D.V.D., projector, Tape recorder enhance the teaching learning process and IQAC suggests changes if needed. At the end of each unit test, progress reports which consist of unit test results and attendance status are submitted to the office for further action. Counseling is given to slow learners. Parents of such students are called to meet their respective faculty member, if required. As the entire lab courses are continuously assessed, students who lack in these courses are given additional help and guidance. They are also given additional lab practice. The faculty members are encouraged to conduct test, quizzes etc. to monitor the academic progress of each student.

6.5.7 How does the institution communicate its quality assurance policies mechanism and outcome to the various internal and external stakeholders?

The institution has evolved stakeholder's web by forming different platforms like college advisory committee, alumni association, Parent teacher meet and various committees with a fair representation of students. The IQAC in the planning process considers feedback collected from all the stake holders to prepare perspectives on development. These developmental perspectives are discussed in the respective meeting of advisory committee, Parent Teacher meetings and alumni. The reflections of the meetings are incorporated in the plan. The management has developed evaluation tools for stake holders to record their opinion, suggestions and objection for constructive developments of future.

CRITERIA VII INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

7.1 Environment Consciousness

7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

There is a no formal conduction of Green Audit in the institution but we are taking necessary step to ensure a clean and healthy environment that aids effective learning. We are counseling students to protect the environment on which we depend all.

7.1.2 What are the following initiatives taken by the college to make the campus ecofriendly?

• Energy Conservation:

The college campus is overly warm and \overly cold. The college classrooms are well aeriated and well lighted that they hardly need any artificial lighting. The institution has installed CFL'S in the main points. This has helped a lot in conservation of electricity. Carefully switching off/unplugging fans lights, computers, printers and electrical equipment when not in use. There is provision of sufficient ventilation in each and every classroom, so limited use of fans, lights and artificial lights in the classrooms. As there is sufficient numbers of windows for each classroom, so the natural light is easily used by the students and teachers of our college. The office equips with computers of TFT screen to save the energy.

• Plantation:

National Service Scheme planted trees by the hands of chief guest of the various programmes. The College organizes tree plantation program to inculcate this tradition among its students. In order to conserve various, plants and trees, various organic fertilizers and water supplied through volunteers of National Service Scheme & peon. To make the campus green and healthy the institutional garden committee is established. Garden Committee takes care of all the plants in the college premises.

• Hazard waste / E- waste management:

The college has the system to dispel garbage in the college campus. The wastage of newspapers, parts of computer, electrical items and waste from science laboratories, is collected by class four employees and it is disposed to raw material shop. The dust- bin are kept everywhere in the campus the dead leaves, polythene and the waste paper are not allowed to be put on fire. The leaves and small cheats of paper are buried in the soil itself. There is also a ban of using plastic papers in the campus. The institution always creates awareness about issues like pollution, conservation of natural resource, sustainable development among the student and the stakeholders.

7.2 Innovations

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning college.

Having vernacular medium students of the locality, students from labor class, farming society, are admitted- in the college. It is a challenge to our teachers to attract them towards curriculum. To enhance the teaching learning process our institution provided the LCD projector, OHP, broadband internet, T.V. Set DVD player facility and computer laboratory.
 The various departments introduced the "Wallpapers" which is very informative and full of knowledge of current issues, related with subject. It helps the students to gain more information of their subjects. It is also useful for the visitor to know the general information of that particular subject. It also caters the student interest in the subject. They actively participate in the above said activity.

3. Career Oriented Course:

The college has supplementary courses apart from the university curriculum to develop the employability of the students which have created a positive impact on the functioning college. We have COP i.e. 'Communicative English' sanctioned by the UGC under which the department teaches the Spoken English and make the students able to face the challenges of the future. Apart from this, the college runs the Carrier and Counseling Cell which provides the proper guidance to the stakeholders about the employment opportunities and communicates them with the competitive successors.

4. Question Bank:

Another innovation is of preparing question bank which helps to remove the burden of students as well as it also helps to improve success rate in the University examination.

5. Feedback Mechanism:

Students give the feedback about the teacher at the end of session/semester. Students of each subject are expected to give their feedback for all the teachers of their class. Besides informal interaction between the students and subject teacher, instruction and guidance of the principal to the faculty members encouraged teaching quality. Teachers are encouraged by departmental head/ principal regarding various measures to improve subject understanding or teaching skills. The teachers have been quite supportive to the students by offering them computerized reading material for practicing at home.

6. Institute always motivated faculty members to attend Orientation/Refresher, short term courses and other relevant courses to enhance the teaching learning process.

7. Computerization of administrative Blocks:

The college has done away with the orthodox system of working in the office. The college administrative block has been fully computerized. The administrative staff has been given formal training to understand the technicalities pertaining to working on the technology.

9. Computerization of library:

The college has made the library fully computerized. The students are having their web browsing facility in the library.

10. It has been regular practice for Principal to meet the students in the class room exclusively or informally outside classroom. To get their informal feedback, the college can control the violent behavior, misbehavior in and outside the classroom. The college also improves academic performance, infrastructural needs, and basic facilities.etc. This reflects the openness of our system. So that quality sustenance is possible.

11. Our college is totally under CCTV which helps the Principal to watch every action of the stakeholders, staff members, visitors, and trespassers. The college can control the violent behavior, misbehavior, sexual harassments, etc. in the classroom and college campus with the help of CCTV system.

01. 'Research Motivation to Faculty and Students'

2. Goal

The main objective of the practice is to provide motivation to research.

3. The context

Under this practice, the research committee motivates teachers to write and present research papers in seminars and conferences as well as submit their Minor Research Projects and Major Research Project to UGC, WRO, Pune. The Students are also motivated to participate in various research festivals arranged by our university.

4. The practice

Under this practice, four teachers submitted and sanctioned their Minor Research Projects. Apart from this, seven teachers submitted their Minor/Major Research Projects to UGC, WRO, Pune. Teachers are prompted to register for M Phil and Ph D. We have research committee to prepare MRP proposals as per UGC guidelines. Besides from this, faculties of the college submits one copy of their Dissertations/Thesis to the college library by which the

stakeholders can aware the research by their teachers as well as they can get innovative ideas of the research from the respective faculties. Apart from this, under this scheme, the students from our college are motivated to participate in the Avishkar Research Festival of SRTM University, Nanded. In these research festivals, in Academic Year 2012-13, two research posters are selected for university level competition. In Academic Year 2013-14, two students of B.Sc. were participated in Inter University Research Competition held at Nagpur.

5. Evidence of success

Through the motivation to the students for research, our four students selected for university level presentation of their posters during Academic Year 2012-13 and two students are selected for Inter- University Research Project Presentation for Academic Year 2013-14. Apart from this, the five faculties have been sanctioned their MRP and the projects are to be submitted very soon.

In order to make the students active besides there classroom study, some faculty members of the college introduced wallpaper. The nature of the wallpaper is to collect the subject related articles/informative paragraphs with current issues related to the subject by editorial board of student. It is supervised by subject teacher. This innovative method of study, enhance the students learning outside the classroom. The wallpapers are providing knowledge to visitors/ parents and students from other college. Students are very competitive to publish their articles in the wallpaper. The published wallpapers are being displayed in notice boards for 15 days. To create the interest of students in their study, it is scientifically proved that seeing capacity of students more active than the hearing, wallpaper supports them to understand topic which is not well understood in the class room. So they actively participated in this activity. It is displayed on the front view of class/main building, automatically they see the wallpaper daily and they prepare the topic for the final examination, they also develop the wish to participate in the wallpaper. This students hand written activity is bearing fruits. Students get opportunity to express themselves through the medium of wall papers and annual magazine. The motto of wallpaper is 'Less Effort, Maximum Gain.'

> Title of the Practice

01. Student Welfare and Adoption Scheme

2. Goal

To provide financial support to the economically backward stakeholders who are regular and sincere during their academic period.

3. The context

Under this scheme, we teachers adopted few economically backward students by which we provide bus passes, fill the examination fees, college uniforms and provide educational aids by which their higher education should be continued.

4. The practice

In this practice, all teachers adopt at least one economically backward student for the help. Through this practice we are able to provide moral and economical support to the stakeholders. All the faculties of the college collect Rs.500/ each for the Student Aid Fund. With the help of this fund we run this practice in the college. 35. SWOC analysis of the department and Future plans

Strength – The head of the department Prin. Dr. Satpute V.D. is member of BOS in English of SRTM University, Nanded for last two terms i.e. since 2009 to till date. He has been actively engaged in forming the syllabus of compulsory and optional English. The department has language laboratory where the students of the subject have opportunity to learn and practice pronunciation and grammar lessons along with the students enrolled for COP programme. Prof. Jaybhaye V. K. performs "Kirtana" i.e. a dramatic art of Bhakti tradition, at nearby villages, wherein he urges the villagers to send their ward for higher education and opt particularly English subject for their bright future. This resulted in having more enrollments for English as optional subject. For facilitating English language teaching, the department use modern latest technological audio visual aids, Power Point Device like LCD projector, OHP to enhance teaching learning process.

Weaknesses – Since the college is located in rural area, the students admitted in the department are from the medium of Marathi who fears to study English as one of the optional subjects. The reason behind this is that till 12th std, the subject is not being taught seriously in most of the junior colleges in the vicinity. They are not very good at basics of language and literature. Hence, they have developed inferiority complex among them that played a great hindrance in the progress of the department. This resulted in having fewer enrollments as compared to other subjects.

Opportunities – We teach rural students, most of them are preparing for competitive examinations like staff selection, BSRB, MPSC, etc where the knowledge of English language is desirable. We have opportunity to improve the stakeholders' competence of English through curricular and extra-curricular activities. The department has opportunity to wipe out the fear about English language among students and develop interest so that they may not hesitate to take English as one of the optional subjects.

Challenges – Students are weak at the level of the pronunciation as well as understanding of the English language. They are not able to write, read & speak English properly. The students of this region are from the Marathi medium colleges and they have Marathi as their mother tongue. Therefore, in such circumstances to teach them to acquire the four basic skills i.e. LRWS (listening, reading, writing and speaking) is the big challenge.

Future Plans – The department is going to arrange national as well as international conferences on various topics from literature and other topics from the discipline. The department will going to organize guest lecturers from the various colleges of the neighboring university and SRTM University, Nanded. We want to collect the various movies on the world famous literary works of English and other languages, which will be

helpful to our students to understand the text and its content. In future, we propose to increase the use of ICT in teaching to make the teaching learning process interesting.

The exams results are declared and marks sheets are issued by the affiliating University.

- The college has to constitute a Planning Board with Principal as Chairman and Heads of departments, IQAC Coordinate. Librarian & Bursor/Senior person from the Accounts department as members
- The Planning Board will finalize allocation to Undergraduate and Postgraduate departments after identifying the heads and deciding on priorities of departments.
- The eligibility criteria for Undergraduate and Postgraduate departments to get assistance under the scheme is given in the XII plan guidelines for Development grant to colleges.
- The Planning Board may refer to the guidelines before finalizing allocation to Undergraduate and Postgraduate departments
- After finalizing the budget allocation for Undergraduate and Postgraduate education, the Planning Board should submit the details as per Annexure I and Annexure II in the XII plan guidelines to the UGC (WRO), Pune latest by 30th June 2014.
- Expenditure on construction, extension, and renovation of building should not exceed 50% of the total grant under GDA. The college must inform the requirement of funds or otherwise for construction, extension, and renovation of building before 30th June, 2014 to enable further release of grant under the scheme.
- UGC has already released adhoc on account grant to the college against this XII Plan allocation.

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- The concept of Merged Schemes introduced during the XI Plan has been done away with and no separate grant under the Merged Schemes will be provided during the XII Plan.
